#### This Week in History

Jan 14, 1784: Continental Congress ratifies the Treaty of Paris

Britain officially agreed to recognize the independence of its 13 former colonies as the new United States of America.

In addition, the treaty settled the boundaries between the United States and what remained of British North America. U.S. fishermen won the right to fish in the Grand Banks, off the Newfoundland coast, and in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. Both sides agreed to ensure payment to creditors in the other nation of debts incurred during the war and to release all prisoners of war. The United States promised to return land confiscated during the war to its British owners, to stop any further confiscation of British property and to honor the property left by the British army on U.S. shores, including slaves. Both countries assumed perpetual rights to access the Mississippi River.

Jan 14, 1973: Undefeated Dolphins beat Redskins in Super Bowl VII

Jan 15, 1919: Molasses floods Boston streets

Fiery hot molasses floods the streets of Boston on this day in 1919, killing 21 people and injuring scores of others. The molasses burst from a huge tank at the United States Industrial Alcohol Company building in the heart of the city.

The United States Industrial Alcohol building was located on Commercial Street near North End Park in Boston. It was close to lunch time on January 15 and Boston was experiencing some unseasonably warm weather as workers were loading freight-train cars within the large building. Next to the workers was a 58-foot-high tank filled with 2.5 million gallons of crude molasses.

Suddenly, the bolts holding the bottom of the tank exploded, shooting out like bullets, and the hot molasses rushed out. An eight-foot-high wave of molasses swept away the freight cars and caved in the building's doors and windows. The few workers in the building's cellar had no chance as the liquid poured down and overwhelmed them.

Jan 16, 1919: Prohibition takes effect

The 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, prohibiting the "manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes," is ratified on this day in 1919 and becomes the law of the land.

Next week, language arts teachers in grades 6-8 will conduct a spelling bee in their classes on January 21, 2014. The top three winners from each class, in grades 6-8, will advance to the school-wide spelling bee on January 23, 2014 at TBD. Parents and relatives are welcome to attend the event on January 23. The winner of the school spelling bee will advance to the county competition in March. The school spelling bee will use study words approved by the National Spelling Bee.
