This Week in History

February 16-February 22

This week in History, the Peace Symbol was designed. We see the peace symbol everywhere—on flags, on T-shirts, and even on necklaces. It often has many colors and fun shapes within it. As cool as the design is, it was actually created with a specific purpose.

On February 21, 1958, Gerald Holtom created the symbol as part of the effort for disarming nuclear bombs in Britain. He designed it after a system called Semaphore Flags, which is a system of conveying messages across a distance using flags. He used the signals for N and D, which stand for nuclear disarmament.

The Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament adopted the symbol, which spread to other areas of public life, particularly the anti-Vietnam War movement in the United States.



Wednesday, February 5th 2014

Dear Parent or Guardian,

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that your student will be taking the Grade 8/10 FCAT 2.0 Writing Test on Tuesday, February 25, 2014. The make up test day is on Wednesday, February 26, 2014. The FCAT 2.0 Writing Test is administered in one 60-minute session in which students write an essay in response to a prompt. Later this spring, your student will receive a score for his/her writing on a scale from 1-6 score points. You may visit <u>http://fcat.fldoe.org/writing-prompts.asp</u> to access writing prompt descriptions and scoring guides with sample essays.

Please review the following policies with your student before testing:

■ Electronic Devices—If your student is found with ANY electronic devices, including, but not limited to, cell phones and smart phones, at any time during testing OR during breaks, his or her test will be invalidated, which means it will not be scored. The best practice is for students to leave devices at home or in their lockers on the day of testing.

■ Testing Rules Acknowledgment—The Writing test includes a Testing Rules Acknowledgment that reads, "I understand the testing rules that were just read to me. If I do not follow these rules, my test score may be invalidated." Prior to testing, test administrators will read the rules to students, and students must acknowledge that they understand the testing rules by signing their names under the statement.

■ Discussing Test Content after Testing—The last portion of the testing rules read to students before they sign the acknowledgment reads, "After the test, you may not discuss the Writing prompt with anyone. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, or posting online, for example, on websites like Facebook, Twitter, or Instagram." If students are found sharing information about test items, even without the intent to cheat, their tests will be invalidated.

■ Leaving Campus—If your student leaves campus before completing the test (for an appointment, illness, etc.), he or she WILL NOT be allowed to complete the test. If your student does not feel well on the day of testing, it may be best for him or her to wait and be tested on the make-up day.

OSS Black History Month Dinner

The annual Black History Month celebration was held at Orlando Science Schools on February 18, 2014. The attendees were greeted with food, music, speeches and student performances. Chief Demings is currently a mayoral candidate for Orange County and is the former police chief of the Orlando Police Department. Chief Demings continued the evening's message of hope. When offered the position of police chief she asked herself, "Why me?" Then she changed the question into, "Why not, me. I'm a part of African American history." Chief Demings encouraged each student to live up to his/her potential. "Every young person has the potential to make history. It's never too late to dream big." The night concluded with an astonishing performance by Orisirsi. The group provided the audience with information about African folklore and the story of how music came to live in our hearts. The group encouraged participation from the audience. Who knew we had so many talented musicians at OSS!








CAN TABS
