#### This Week in History

Nov 6 1860- Abraham Lincoln is elected 16th president of the United States.

#### Nov 13 1851- The London-to-Paris telegraph begins operation.

In 1851 a functional telegraph cable had been laid across the English Channel. Not only could news travel between Paris and London, but the technological feat seemed to symbolize the peace between Britain and France just a few decades after the Napoleonic Wars. Soon telegraph companies began surveying the coast of Nova Scotia to prepare for laying cable, which eventually led to the laying of a telegraph cable under the Atlantic Ocean from North America to Europe.

#### Nov 20 1945- The Nazi war crime trials begin at Nuremberg.

On this day in 1945, a series of trials of accused Nazi war criminals, conducted by a U.S., French, and Soviet military tribunal based in Nuremberg, Germany, begins. Twenty-four former Nazi officials were tried, and when it was all over, one year later, half would be sentenced to death by hanging.

These trials of accused war criminals were authorized by the London Agreement, signed in August 1945 by the United States, Great Britain, the Soviet Union, and the provisional government of France. It was agreed at that time that those Axis officials whose war crimes extended beyond a particular geographic area would be tried by an international war tribunal (a trial for accused Japanese war criminals would be held in Tokyo). Nineteen other nations would eventually sign on to the provisions of the agreement.

#### Dec 7 1941- Pearl Harbor was bombed.

At 7:55 a.m. Hawaii time, a Japanese dive bomber bearing the red symbol of the Rising Sun of Japan on its wings appears out of the clouds above the island of Oahu. A swarm of 360 Japanese warplanes followed, descending on the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor in a ferocious assault. The surprise attack struck a critical blow against the U.S. Pacific fleet and drew the United States irrevocably into World War II.

#### Dec 11 1946- UNICEF is founded

In the aftermath of World War II, the General Assembly of the United Nations votes to establish the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF), an organization to help provide relief and support to children living in countries devastated by the war.

After the food and medical crisis of the late 1940s passed, UNICEF continued its role as a relief organization for the children of troubled nations and during the 1970s grew into a vocal advocate of children's rights. During the 1980s, UNICEF assisted the U.N. Commission on Human Rights in the drafting of the Convention on the Rights of the Child. After its introduction to the U.N. General Assembly in 1989, the Convention on the Rights of the Child became the most widely ratified human rights treaty in history, and UNICEF played a key role in ensuring its enforcement.

Orlando Science Schools is so excited to be selected to participate in Scholastic's Classroom and Community Group and The National Basketball Referees Association's (NBRA) reading program "TIME OUT for Reading." TIME OUT for Reading is an impelling mentoring program designed to deepen literacy and instill a love of reading in students through mentors who are willing to share an hour with engaging, grade-appropriate books.

The first session went really well last week with both the NBA Referees and students reading together and enjoying an intense book discussion in the classroom after each chapter of the "The Watsons go to Birmingham". Both referees and student are looking forward the next session.

TIME OUT for Reading is a joint partnership between Scholastic Inc. and the NBRA. NBA Referees will commit one hour of their time, once a month, to read to sixth grade students in NBA cities. Every month in November, December, January, February, and March, the mentors will spend one hour reading and discussing a book with their assigned classroom. The most exciting part of this is that every student will get to keep a copy of the book to take home and build a home library!

Books will be read, discussed and then given to your child to bring home. Students will be asked to finish reading any book that is introduced in the class but not completely read during the time the reader is in the classroom.
